Students Have "Experience of a Lifetime" on ECI-Sponsored Youth Tour

Logan Halverson and Dustin Toale of Independence recently participated in the Electric Cooperative Youth Tour program in Washington, D.C., sponsored by East-Central Iowa Rural Electric Cooperative.

In an action-filled week with 31 other Iowa students, Logan and Dustin learned first-hand what it is like to be involved in politics, community service, and today's pressing issues in the energy industry. They met Sens. Chuck Grassley and Tom Harkin as well as Reps. Bruce Braley, Leonard Boswell, Dave Loebsack, Tom Latham, and Steve King. They also saw historic sites and met over 1,500 students from across the country who participated in their state's Youth Tour program.

The Iowa Electric Cooperatives' Youth Tour is a joint effort of local electric co-ops such as ECI REC, the Iowa Association of Electric Cooperatives (IAEC), and the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA).

Logan and Dustin said they had the experience of a lifetime meeting with peers from other states and IAEC staff during

the Washington trip. "The Youth Tour was so amazing," Dustin said. Logan shared, "It was really cool to meet my senator and representative, and learn about politics up close. Plus, I made friends from nearly every state and experienced history first-hand. It really made me think about what it means to be an American and showed that people my age do care about this country."

In addition to taking in the sights of the nation's capital, all the state groups convened for National Youth Day, sponsored by NRECA, to learn from public figures and other inspirational speakers. This year's Youth Day agenda included Mike Schlappi, a four-time Paralympic Medallist and two-time Wheelchair Basketball World Champion. Schlappi shared his inspiring message: "Just because you can't stand up, doesn't mean you can't stand out."

Since 1957, Iowa's electric cooperatives have sponsored over 1,300 high school juniors and seniors on visits to their U.S. congressional representatives in Washington, D.C. The IAEC is a Des Moines-based service organization for 42 Iowa electric cooperatives, which provide electric service to approximately 650,000 Iowans throughout the state.
